SAIS CORE TRAINING 2022 OVERVIEW

We have made it to the end of another big year! A lot has happened, and exciting changes are underway for the year ahead of us. This newsletter 2022 has been another big year for our SAIS Core Training which reached over 150 TQI registered educators this year. This training was also delivered to a significant number of non-TQI registered school staff this year in whole school deliveries.

Training was delivered to schools from all sectors including ACT Government, Catholic, Anglican and Independent Schools. Both primary and secondary schools engaged with this training as well as colleges.

Following trends from 2020, our biggest uptake of trainings were private bookings delivered in schools for staff from that school, though there was also great uptake for the public cross-school sessions, especially in terms 2 and 4.

SAIS will continue to offer both public training sessions each term in 2023 alongside school bookings for internal training.



SAIS CORE TRAINING UPDATES

After 5 years of delivering the popular TQI-accredited SAIS Core Training with updates and improvements some big changes are coming next year. The SAIS Core Training you know and love is returning as the restructured SAIS Introductory Training featuring new and improved content.

For those who have completed the SAIS Core (or Introductory) Training, or who are very familiar with the content, SAIS has accredited a new program - SAIS Extension Training. The extension training will be available in the new year.

Both workshops have been reworked to focus on more practical content, activities, and interactive learning. Featuring new case studies and the integration of revised SAIS resources, these programs reflect our commitment to feedback responsiveness and quality improvement.

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SAIS INTRODUCTORY TRAINING

INTRODUCTION TO THE ACT SAFE AND INCLUSIVE SCHOOLS INITIATIVE

Training participants will be guided through key features of the Initiative and how the Initiative can be engaged for support. Participants will be supported in developing confidence to communicate about the Initiative and its activities within their school and to the wider school community.

This module will help participants connect to the wider network of schools, services and support available when undertaking inclusion work around sex, gender and sexuality.

SEX, GENDER, SEXUALITY AND SCHOOL

Participants will unpack the diversity of sex, gender, and sexuality and how this is present in school environments.

Supported with qualitative and quantitative Australia data, participants will navigate how this diversity is experienced by students and the impacts of prejudice and discrimination on the student experience.

INCLUSIVE PRACTICE MODULE 1 IN THEORY AND PRACTICE

Training participants will be introduced to inclusive principles and practical strategies to create inclusive school environments such as the use of inclusive language, actively affirming diversity at school and responding to prejudice & discrimination.

Through case studies and guided, critical conversations participants will navigate real-world scenarios and situations, with a focus on best practice approaches to meet the needs of the school community.

SELECTING TEACHING AND LEARNING RESOURCES

Participants will explore the needs and benefits of inclusive resources in teaching and learning environments.

Through the use of the newly updated and revised SAIS Resource Selection Tool, participants will be guided through approaches to identify and adapt teaching and learning resources for classroom application.

Using worked examples and the identification of where recommended resources can be found, this module offers a practical introduction to inclusive learning.

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SAIS EXTENSION TRAINING

SEX, GENDER, SEXUALITY RECAP

Training participants will be guided through a quick refresher and orientation on the concepts of sex, gender and sexuality through a practical and interactive activity and clarifying discussion.

SUPPORTING TGD + I STUDENTS AT SCHOOL

Utilising the SAIS Good Practice Guide – Supporting Students Affirming Gender at School and the SHFPACT-AGA joint resource Including Intersex – Responding to issues affecting the educational experiences of intersex students in Australia, participants will be guided through practical approaches to support TGD+I students at school and strategies to address specific barriers that impact trans, gender diverse and intersex students.

Through practical case studies drawn from commonly reported experiences, participants will address topics such as bathroom and gendered facility access, school camps and excursions, participation in sports and supporting students at school who do not have support at home.

INCLUSIVE PRACTICE MODULE 2 – SUPPORTING STUDENT LEADERSHIP ACTIVITIES

With the use of the new SAIS Events Calendar and the updated and revised SAIS School-based Events and Activities Guide, participants will be guided through ways to support student leadership and participation in the school community through whole-of-school events and activities to raise awareness and foster inclusion.

With a focus on marking days of significance such as IDAHOBIT (International Day against Homophobia, Biphobia, Intersexism and Transphobia) and Wear It Purple Day, this module explores ways to signpost inclusion, support student voice and foster an inclusive school community.

EMBEDDING INCLUSION IN THE CURRICULUM

Designed as an introduction to approaching inclusion in the curriculum, participants will be introduced to areas of the curriculum where inclusion can be actively incorporated across a range of topics.

With practical examples and tailored Primary and Secondary-School modules, this highly customisable section offers flexibility for a range of audiences.

Mapped to areas of the Australian Curriculum, participants are supported to identify ways in which diversity and inclusion can be incorporated into classroom learning.

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END-OF YEAR DAYS OF SIGNIFICANCE



INTERSEX AWARENESS DAY

The 26th of October was Intersex Awareness Day. This day came about as a time to highlight the human rights issues faced by intersex people around the world. Intersex Awareness Day has been celebrated since 2003 and commemorates one of the earliest moments in modern intersex activism.

On October 26th 1996, Intersex community, activists and advocates protested outside of the annual conference of the American Academy of Paediatrics in Boston. Then and now activists and advocates campaign for intersex people's right to bodily autonomy, medical rights and informed consent.



INTERSEX DAY OF SOLIDARITY (INTERSEX REMEMBRANCE DAY)

Closely following Intersex Awareness Day, Intersex Day of solidarity is a day to mark the lives and contributions of intersex activists, individuals and advocates that came before and the intersex people who have lost their lives and been harmed by both historic and ongoing harmful practices and human rights abuses globally. The 8th of November was chosen as it also marks the birth of Herculine Barbin, a French 19th century intersex woman whose life and experiences were immortalised in her memoir providing unique insight into intersex history.

Herculine's story is powerful and speaks to the ongoing experiences faced by intersex people today, forming the basis of the Intersex Human Rights movement.



TRANSGENDER AWARENESS WEEK

Transgender Awareness Week is a time of acknowledgement, visibility and celebration of transgender, non-binary and gender diverse people around the globe. It is also a week to raise awareness around the experiences and issues faced by transgender people across the world. This is a time for promoting inclusion, advocacy, activism and sharing stories and education. It is also a perfect opportunity to commit to anti-discrimination and addressing prejudice, bigotry and transphobia in society.

During this week it is important to let transgender, non-binary and gender diverse people in our community know that they are welcome, loved, supported, and valued.



TRANSGENDER DAY OF REMEMBRANCE

At the end of Transgender Awareness Week, we mark Transgender Day of Remembrance.

This is a time to acknowledge, commemorate, and mourn the loss of transgender people who have lost their lives due to hatred, bigotry, transphobia, and violence.

It is draws attention to the ongoing experiences of marginalisation and violence endured by transgender, non-binary, and gender diverse people around the world.

It is often marked by a vigil or memorial.

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CAPITAL OF EQUALITY: SCHOOL LIBRARY BOOK PACKS

AT SEXUAL HEALTH AND FAMILY PLANNING ACT (SHFPACT) WE ARE FINALLY COMING TO THE END OF OUR INCREDIBLE RAINBOW REPRESENTATION BOOK PROJECT. WHILE THIS IS NOT A PROJECT FROM THE SAFE AND INCLUSIVE SCHOOL'S INITIATIVE, WE SUPPORT THE WORK OF SHFPACT IN THIS AREA.

Thanks to a generous grant from the ACT Government's Capital of Equality Grants Round at the end of 2021, the past year has been spent building an incredible resource bank for ACT School libraries.

Consultation and collaboration facilitated incredible feedback, suggestions and input from ACT teacher-librarians, Melbourne-based LGBTQIA+ book store Hares and Hyenas and passionate community members.

The aim of this project was to identify and supply books that positively address, reflect and include stories, characters and topics related to diverse family structures, rainbow families, people who are same-sex attracted transgender, non-binary, gender diverse and intersex. Also featured are non-fiction texts about LGBTIQA+ history and historical figures, celebrities and role models, and texts that address diversity and inclusion. Intersectionality was a key consideration with intentional focus placed on texts that portray a range diversity from writers with lived experience.

These texts have been captured in recommended resource lists that catalogue titles recommended by community members, schools, and those identified by SHFPACT and Hares and Hyenas. These lists will be published and made available at the end of the year and promoted in early 2023.

In addition to this, a small subset of 10-14 titles were identified for each school level (Early Years, Primary, Secondary and College). These titles were purchased with grant funds at Hares and Hyenas and YOUth&I (a small intersex youth publication). Over 400 books were purchased, becoming 40 book packs that are being distributed to ACT schools who applied.

A small project launch happended on Wednesday 14th December.

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YOUTH&I

With no date yet announced, YOUth&I 3 is set to be released before the end of 2023.



Featuring work from over 20 young intersex creatives from around the world, YOUth&I is a one-of-a-kind intersex designed

produced, and edited publication. YOUth&I 3 features works in English, Spanish, Shona, French and Portuguese (non-English pieces have also been translated into English) alongside a collection of digital and traditional artworks. The importance of a project like YOUth&I is best described in the following words from the website:

YOUth&I seeks to create a space for young intersex people to share their stories in their own words and not be taken out of context or rewritten by endosex (non-intersex) people. A space for intersex voices to be heard in their own right. A chance to educate the people we live with and to connect with others including those who, even if they don't know the word intersex, might recognise some of these stories and experiences within themselves.

Creating safe spaces in community to share, hear, and hold each other is incredibly important. While the intersex community in Australia is growing, spaces solely for intersex youth have so far been difficult to create and sustain. YOUth&I provides a space for young intersex people in Australia and elsewhere to share, create, be visible, and be valued. It is one answer to the challenges of storytelling in a world that is only just beginning to listen and where sharing can be painful, unsupported, unsafe, and not always clear whether it leads to change. It is also one answer to the challenges of bringing together young intersex people and giving them the opportunity to express the creativity and joy in their lives.

SAIS had another great response to our Wear It Purple Day small grants round in 2022. In total 12 schools received a small grant of \$200 to assist with running a student-led, staff-supported activity for Wear it Purple Day. Included, were 3 primary schools, 7 secondary schools and 2 colleges.

This year some of the events and activities included:

- Library book displays
- Pledge/inspiration quote walls
- Murals and art installations
- Collage and poster making
- Pin, ribbon, and badge making
- Purple food stalls, morning and afternoon teas, cupcake decorating, rainbow lunch boxes, canteen items and a community BBQ
- Accessory stations (nail polish, face paint, makeup, hair spray, nail art and glitter etc.)
- Purple fashion parades
- Photo booths/photo backdrop walls
- Presentations and documentary screenings
- Trivia and games
- Stalls selling pride merchandise
- School decorations and classroom door-decorating competitions
- A school disco and karaoke
- Gold coin fundraising
